SCHOOL TRUSTEE ELECTIONS 2016

The Triennial election is nearly upon us with election date set for 3rd June 2016. Opotiki College will have 6 parent representative positions to be filled. If you have skills that you can share it is time to give some thought to standing for election. Below is the key information all Parents and Caregivers need to know:

- Nominations will be called for in early May
- Voting papers are sent in the post late May, so please ensure you have updated your mailing address with the school office
- A booklet "A parents' guide to the role of the board of trustees" is available from the school office

What is a school board of trustees? School Boards are responsible for the school's performance and ensuring that all legal requirements are met.

Who are the trustees? Elected Parent Reps, a Staff elected Rep, a Student elected Rep and the Principal. The Board may choose to have co-opted trustees from time to time should they require expertise in certain areas.

What do trustees do? First and foremost a board is accountable for student progress and achievement to its parents and community. The board has the overall responsibility for the school. This includes legal obligations covering curriculum, property, personnel, finance and health and safety.

What skills do trustees need? Trustees are active leaders in their schools and need to work well in a team, ask challenging questions and have good communication skills. Boards need a balance of skills and experiences to ensure effective processes for planning, monitoring, reporting and reviewing the school's performance are in place.

Who can become a trustee? Parents, caregivers and people from the wider community can be nominated for election to a school board. Your school will be happy to help you find out more about standing for election or nominating someone else.

What is the time commitment? Trustees are expected to attend the monthly scheduled meeting as well as any sub-committee meetings they are involved in. Board members are sent all the documentation prior to the meeting and are expected to have read it all thoroughly before the meeting. Currently the board meets on the last Tuesday of each month.
